

History/Location: Founded in 1836, Emory & Henry is the oldest college in Southwest Virginia. It is named for Bishop John Emory of the United Methodist church and Patrick Henry, orator of the Revolution and the first Governor of Virginia. It is also one of the few colleges in the South to have operated more than 170 years under the same name and with the same affiliation: the United Methodist Church. Our campus encompasses 331 pristine acres in the village of Emory, Virginia, in the Virginia Highlands, one-half mile off Interstate 81 (exit 26) and 40 minutes from a major regional airport. The campus is within view of Virginia's two highest peaks, Mount Rogers and Whitetop Mountain, and is 8 miles north of the historic town of Abingdon, Virginia, home of the renowned Barter Theatre. It is also within easy driving distance is the metropolitan Tri-Cities region of Bristol, Johnson City, and Kingsport.

Academic Programs and Degrees: Emory & Henry College offers programs of study in art, athletic training, biology, business administration, chemistry, computer information management, economics, education (early childhood through high school, including many subject-area options), English, environmental studies, geography, history, international, languages, mass communications, mathematics, music, philosophy, physical education, physics, political science, psychology, public policy and community service; religion, sociology and anthropology, and theater. Pre-professional preparation in dentistry, law, medicine, and veterinary medicine as well as pharmacy may be completed within several of the programs and leads to high acceptance rates in graduate and professional schools. The Bachelor of Arts degree is awarded in all programs of study and the Bachelor of Science degree in selected areas. Individualized programs of study may be developed in consultation with a faculty adviser.

Faculty: Professors are among the best in the nation. Six times in the last 19 years, Emory & Henry professors have been named Virginia Professor of the Year of the Carnegie Foundation—more than any other college or university in Virginia. Previous recipients of this award are: Dr. Ed Damer, Philosophy '89; Dr. Kathleen Chamberlain, English '93; Dr. David Copeland, mass communications '97; Dr. Teresa Keller, mass communications '03; Dr. Jack Roper, history '05. Teresa Keller was awarded the 2010 Outstanding Faculty Award by the State Council for Higher Education in Virginia. Other recipients of this award are: Dr. Steve Fisher, political science '94; Dr. Samir Saliba, political science '97; Dr. John Lang, English '99; Dr. Jim Duchamp, chemistry '09. Emory & Henry has 75 full-time faculty members, and the current student-faculty ratio is 10:1. 47% of the full time faculty are tenured, while 85% held the doctorate or terminal degree in their field. Average 2008-09 AAUP Salaries were \$74,587 for Full Professors, \$55,463 for Associate Professors, and \$46,642 for Assistant Professors.

Enrollment: Fall 2009 undergraduate headcount enrollment was 972 (921 FTE). Fall 2008 graduate headcount enrollment was 30 (30 FTE). 88% were White, 8% were Black-non-Hispanic, and 1.5% were international students. 77% of students lived in residence halls.

Admission/Retention: 291 first-time degree seeking freshmen and 47 first-time degree seeking Transfers enrolled in 2009. 70% of freshman applicants were accepted and 31% enrolled. The average SAT math and verbal score for enrolled first time freshmen was 1031. The middle 50% ranges for SAT scores were 450-570 for Verbal and 460-570 for Math. 71% of Fall 2008 Freshmen returned in Fall 2009, and 57% who entered in Fall 2002 graduated within six years.

Costs: Annual 2009-10 full-time tuition and fees were \$24,880. Room and Board was \$8,300.

Accreditation: Emory & Henry College is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award bachelor's and master's degrees.

Athletics: Emory & Henry participates in NCAA Division III, is a member of the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC), and fields varsity teams in men's football, soccer, basketball, golf, baseball, cross country, and tennis, and in women's cross country, volleyball, basketball, softball, soccer, tennis and swimming.

Budget: The IPEDS Total Operating Revenues for 2008-09 were \$34,913,415. Total Operating Expenses for 2008-09 were \$35,592,838. As of June 30 2009, net endowment assets were \$66,842,675.
